Great Moments in the History of Childhelp

1959

International Orphans is founded by Sara (Buckner) O'Meara and Yvonne (Lime) Fedderson to support 11 Japanese-American children found homeless during a typhoon in Tokyo.

1975

In coordination with the US Military, Sara and Yvonne organize what becomes known as "Operation Baby Lift."

1978

Sara and Yvonne open the doors of their pioneering residential treatment center, exclusively for abused and neglected children, Childhelp Merv Griffin Village, in Beaumont, California.

1979

Through the hard work of Sara and Yvonne, President Jimmy Carter designates April as National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

1982

Children's Village USA launches a national campaign for the prevention of child abuse and neglect, including America's first national toll-free hotline - 1-800-4-A-CHILD[®].

1991

Childhelp purchases 270-acres of land in Culpeper, Virginia to site the Childhelp Alice C. Tyler Village which would open in 1993.

1998

Supporters celebrate the grand opening and dedication of the Childhelp Children's Center of Arizona dedicated to Linda Pope in downtown Phoenix.

2000

The U.S. House of Representatives unanimously passes House Concurrent Resolution 76, supporting the Childhelp National Day of Hope. The resolution encourages Americans to take action and pray toward ending child abuse and neglect.

2010

At the Governor's Convention, Childhelp spearheads successful anti-abuse legislation. In an unprecedented show of bipartisan support, each governor from every state in the Union signs the Governor's Resolution to Eradicate Child Abuse.

2011

Childhelp partners with Arizona State University to create Childhelp "Speak Up Be Safe" – an innovative prevention education curriculum to help keep children safe.

2017

Childhelp reaches the extraordinary milestone of more than 10 million children served by its programs across prevention, intervention and treatment.





THE CHALLENGE



Children are suffering from America's best kept secret – child abuse. It is a national epidemic in the United States, with a new report being made every 10 seconds.

The U.S. has one of the worst child abuse mortality rates among industrialized nations. Every day on average, we lose between four and seven children to abuse and neglect.^{1,2}

While the last two decades have seen success after success against physical and sexual abuse, findings of neglect have remained largely unmoved. Around 80% of child maltreatment victims are victims of neglect – more than half a million children and 1,000 fatalities every year, not including the uncounted suffering in silence.

Five Too Many is a community campaign supported by the Childhelp team of volunteers, child caregivers, social workers, medical professionals, administrators, and advocates that aims to support successful prevention, intervention and treatment efforts nationwide. Our vision is a future where every childhood is free of abuse and neglect and no child is lost at the hands of another individual.

Together we can take action against inaction, and together we can keep the five alive.

CHILDHELP SOLUTIONS

The first step of the Childhelp approach to ending child abuse is to prevent the cycle of child abuse from continuing. There are clear links among child maltreatment and future violence perpetration or victimization; studies show that about 30% of abused and neglected children will later abuse children, continuing this horrible cycle. We believe the key to preventing child abuse is education and awareness, which is exactly what our prevention programs provide.

PREVENTION

CHILDHELP SPEAK UP BE SAFE

Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe is a national, research-based, evidence-informed primary prevention curriculum aimed at stopping and preventing child abuse and neglect.

The content and delivery of our pre-kindergarten through 12th grade curricula are based on several areas of research including child development, learning styles, social psychology, and child abuse and neglect prevention. Lessons, available via an online virtual campus, teach children how to identify unsafe situations, how to identify and talk to safe adults, and five key safety rules children can follow to help adults keep them safe. Materials and resources are provided for children, teachers, facilitators, parents, school administrators, and community members to help build a safety network to protect all children from abuse and neglect.



The Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe for Athletes Awareness Campaign exists to promote the safe physical, emotional, educational, and spiritual development of youth athletes. The program is designed to aid coaches, educators and parents in providing a secure environment where children can reach their full potential.









75% of students participating in the pilot program rated Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe positively.



Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe for Athletes, underwritten by The Foundation for Global Sports Development, reached 60,669 participants this year.







Sam's Story

Most children don't know who to turn to when they are threatened and told to keep quiet. So the abuse continues and the child feels powerless to stop it.

Sam*, a shy but courageous 12 year-old from Northern California, stayed silent for six years before disclosing that a family caregiver was abusing him. He was just six years old when his nanny first molested him.

When Sam's school implemented the Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe curriculum, he and his classmates learned how to identify safe adults, how to talk to them about abuse, and about the Childhelp National Child Abuse Hotline.

Within days of the lesson, Sam disclosed to police that he was being abused. His abuser was arrested. After six long years, Childhelp was able to help Sam stop the abuse, direct him to the physical and psychological care he needed, and help move him to a safe environment where he could begin the healing process.

CHILDHELP COMMUNITY CENTER

Healthy communities create safer environments for children. A Childhelp Community Center provides low-income, at-risk families with after-school childcare support, academic tutoring, self-esteem building, enrichment programs, parenting classes, health fairs, employment life skills, food/clothing drives, and a host of other programs that encourage happy, secure families.



96% of parents/caregivers who enrolled completed the Strengthening Families program.

CHILDHELP SOLUTIONS

The second step of the Childhelp approach to ending child abuse focuses on intervention and removal of children from abusive and dangerous situations. More than 80% of children who die as a result of child abuse or neglect are not yet old enough for kindergarten, making it impossible for them to remove themselves from harmful situations. Childhelp intervention programs help save these children from becoming a statistic in the war against child abuse and neglect.

CHILDHELP NATIONAL CHILD ABUSE HOTLINE: 1-800-4-A-CHILD®

Our 24-hours-a-day, 7-days-a-week hotline serves the United States, Canada, U.S. Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and Guam. Staffed exclusively with degreed professional counselors, this confidential service offers crisis intervention, information, literature, and referrals to emergency, social service, and support resources. Through translators, the hotline can communicate in over 170 languages.

CHILDHELP FOSTER FAMILY AGENCIES

Childhelp recruits, screens, trains and certifies foster families to ensure that children who have been through trauma are gently introduced into safe environments with sensitive guardians. 24 hour on-call assistance, respite care, financial stipends, group counseling, and transportation assistance are just some of the ways Childhelp supports the healing process.

CHILDHELP ADOPTION AGENCIES

Childhelp Adoption Agencies conduct home studies, assist families in preparing for placement, and find children the loving parents they deserve.

CHILDHELP GROUP HOMES

For abused children, a Childhelp Group Home can be an oasis of peace and safety from lives of chaos and fear. Through structured activities with therapists and plenty of play, children regain confidence and begin to repair their fractured lives.





Childhelp Group homes served 34 youth in FY2017, with 18 successfully graduating from the program.



Noelle's Story

By the time Noelle* called the Childhelp National Child Abuse Hotline, she was sobbing — afraid that no one would believe her. She said her stepfather had been abusing her for years. She'd told her mother, but her mother refused to believe it.

Noelle was devastated that the one person in her life she trusted most would not intervene to stop the abuse. She felt utterly alone. But when Noelle's younger sister was targeted by her abuser, she could no longer remain silent. That's when Noelle decided to call Childhelp.

Our counselor stayed on the phone with Noelle for almost an hour. Together, they identified a trusted aunt who could help Noelle take the next step of reporting the abuse to authorities.

After speaking with our counselor, and with her aunt's support, Noelle found the courage to talk to her mother again about the stepfather's sexual abuse. This time, her mom listened. Together, they called the police, and the stepfather was arrested and convicted.

One week later, Childhelp received a call back from Noelle. On the line with her was her mother. Through tears, mother and daughter thanked Childhelp for being there in their time of need, saying: "Your national hotline saved our family."

CHILDHELP SOLUTIONS

With innovative treatment programs, Childhelp can help heal children who have been affected by child abuse. The issue is substantial; a report of child abuse is made every ten seconds, which means we have a lot of work to do to help these children recover both physically and psychologically. Childhelp treatment programs exist to give children a safe haven with love and the tools needed to overcome their damaging pasts.



TREATMENT

CHILDHELP RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT VILLAGES

A Childhelp Residential Treatment Village is an intensive arena of 24-hour nurturing in an idyllic country setting. Professional counselors provide equine, art, ranch and traditional talk therapy to children who have been exposed to extreme brutality. On-site nonpublic schools help even the most severely abused and neglected children recover their education to an appropriate grade level.



98% of youth living at the Childhelp Alice C. Tyler Village experienced an increase in social functioning skills.



80% of youth living at the Childhelp Merv Griffin Village showed significant clinical improvement in family functioning.



CHILDHELP CHILDREN'S ADVOCACY CENTERS

Pioneered by the Childhelp co-founders, these safe havens are designed to significantly reduce the trauma of abuse. The centers house a coalition of law enforcement, prosecution, social service agencies, medical professionals, and therapists working in unison to investigate abuse and heal injured children. A fully equipped mobile unit brings these essential services to children in remote areas, ensuring that every child is cared for.

Krista's Story

When 9-year-old Krista* arrived at the Childhelp Merv Griffin Village in Beaumont, California, she couldn't speak, had few self-care skills, and appeared to have developmental delays typically associated with Down Syndrome.

This child had been kept in a cage. Her mother was a low-functioning individual, and using a cage was the only way she believed she could contain her daughter for whom she didn't know how to care.

Krista had never held a fork or spoon, and she was understandably frightened and aggressive when she came to Childhelp. However, within three months' time, she was playing with other girls and boys and exhibiting an incredible desire to learn and grow. She wanted to be like the other kids.

Over a relatively short time, Krista learned how to eat properly, how to communicate appropriately with others, and made countless other improvements. The county social worker assigned to her case was able to locate her father, who had no idea the abuse and neglect were happening. With guidance from Childhelp, Krista and her family began transition and family therapy. We taught her father and his sister — Krista's aunt — new skills so they could continue effective interventions at home, and Krista has since been a phenomenal success.

FIONGIMP



JAPAN

In 1959, two rising Hollywood starlets – Sara (Buckner) O'Meara and Yvonne (Lime) Fedderson – traveled to Tokyo as part of a government-sponsored tour to entertain American soldiers.

When they arrived, the city was shut down by a severe typhoon. After days trapped in their hotel room, the willful and daring actresses grew restless and decided to sneak out. They came across a group of children huddled beneath a fallen awning, barefoot, and shivering in the cold.

Without a second thought, they smuggled all eleven children into their hotel room where they bathed, fed and tucked them into bed for the night. The next morning, in their unsuccessful search for an orphanage, the ladies learned that these "throwaway children" would receive no government support because they were half American.

In response, the two founded *International* Orphans and began their lifelong careers in fundraising and philanthropy by collecting from American servicemen after their shows. With this money, they started their own orphanage with the help of a kind local woman, Mama Kin.

VIETNAM

Throughout the 1960s, Sara and Yvonne collected enough money to build four orphanages in Japan. Congress then asked them to do the same in Vietnam. By 1975, the two had built and maintained five orphanages, a hospital and a school in Vietnam.

That year, Marine Corp Lieutenant General Lewis W. Walt asked to meet with them and told them a history-changing secret: that he was expecting orders from the President to pull troops out of Vietnam.

Sara and Yvonne immediately thought of the orphans. They knew the children would be the Vietcong's first targets because the orphanages were funded by Americans and the children themselves were of mixed blood. They called their ally, Congressman Corman, and boldly requested planes to evacuate the boys and girls in their care.

Within 24 hours the call came in: If you can organize the children, I'll help get the planes. Sara and Yvonne worked tirelessly for weeks to pull off "Operation Baby Lift." They cried tears of joy as children were flown out of war-torn Vietnam and placed into the arms of loving adoptive parents.

AMERICA

Word guickly spread of the wonderful things Sara and Yvonne were doing with International Orphans, and they were invited by Nancy Reagan, then the First Lady of California, to speak about their life-saving work.

Their heart-wrenching story would be the perfect way to address "America's best kept secret" - child abuse – with the nation. Late in 1975, the Senate Subcommittee on Children and Youth had released a study indicating that child abuse was the leading cause of death in young children. Alerting the country of this horrible epidemic was the first step in helping the cause, and the ladies were eager to share their experience and expertise.

And so, Sara and Yvonne turned their attention stateside to protect US children from abuse and neglect. The two raised funds for a residential village to treat abused children ages 2-12 and give them a safe place to call home. The village pioneered art and animal therapies for recovering children and was even the topic of the first television special on child abuse in America.

Since then, Childhelp has grown to become a leading authority on child abuse intervention, prevention and treatment. From the original 11 orphans to 10 million children served (and counting), every part of the organization's work is informed and shaped following the Childhelp motto: For the Love of a Child.
