HOPE TAKES ROOT: 66 YEARS OF CHILDHELP

1959:

Sara (Buckner) O'Meara and Yvonne (Lime) Fedderson found International Orphans to support 11 Japanese-American children left homeless by a typhoon in Tokyo. They were later asked by Congress to replicate their successes by building five orphanages, a hospital, and a school in Vietnam.

1975

Sara and Yvonne coordinate "Operation Baby Lift" with the U.S. Military, facilitating the relocation of thousands of Vietnamese children to adoptive families in the West.

1978

Sara and Yvonne establish a groundbreaking residential treatment center in Beaumont, California, exclusively dedicated to providing care for abused and neglected children. 1979:

Sara and Yvonne's advocacy leads President Jimmy Carter to designate April as National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

1982

Children's Village USA, later renamed Childhelp, launches the nation's first toll-free child abuse hotline: 1-800-4-A-CHILD.

1991:

Childhelp acquires 270 acres of land in Culpeper, Virginia, to establish a new residential treatment facility, The Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp.

1998:

Childhelp celebrates the grand opening of the Childhelp Children's Center of Arizona, dedicated to Linda Pope, in downtown Phoenix.

2000:

The U.S. House of Representatives unanimously passes a resolution supporting the Childhelp National Day of Hope, encouraging action and prayer to end child abuse.

2010:

At the Governor's Convention, Childhelp leads the signing of the Governor's Resolution to Eradicate Child Abuse, with support from all 50 state governors.

2011:

In partnership with Arizona State University, Childhelp launches "Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe," a groundbreaking prevention education curriculum to protect children.

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A Hidden Epidemic: The Reality of Child

Every year, millions of children in the United States fall victim to the devastating effects of abuse and neglect. Child protection agencies receive over 4.3 million referrals involving nearly 7.8 million children, a staggering number that paints a grim picture of a crisis affecting children from all walks of life. Tragically, the true scope of the epidemic is even worse: for every incident of child abuse or neglect reported, an estimated two incidents go unreported, leaving countless children suffering in silence.

Abuse in America

Each day, an average of five children lose their lives to abuse and neglect, with the youngest among them bearing the heaviest toll. But the damage doesn't end there. The long-term consequences of abuse are far-reaching, often leading to addiction, mental illness, chronic health issues, and early mortality. These invisible scars perpetuate cycles of trauma, affecting not only the children but entire communities for generations.



Strategic Partnerships: Empowering Change

One of the key pillars of Childhelp's future growth is our strategic partnership with leading organizations in the tech industry. Our collaboration with Meta is a critical step in the fight against sextortion and will expand the reach of our Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe (CH SUBS) program, including the evidence-based core curriculum designed to educate and protect children in grades pre-K-12. "We are thrilled to partner with Meta to develop a new SUBS curriculum designed to empower youth with the knowledge and tools to recognize, avoid, and prevent online exploitation," said, Cheridan Melvin, Senior Director for Childhelp.

With Meta's support, we are launching a new CH SUBS module on sextortion and online safety in February 2025, increasing awareness and providing critical resources to facilitators, youth, and their families. Childhelp and Meta engaged a panel of subject matter experts committed to child safety to ensure the program remains impactful and relevant. "This partnership allows us to address the increasing challenges young people encounter while navigating digital platforms. By collaborating with Meta and leveraging insights from abuse prevention experts, we are taking meaningful steps to safeguard youth and foster safer online environments," said Melvin.

Additionally, our partnership with Google has amplified the reach of the Childhelp National Child Abuse Hotline. By leveraging Google's search capabilities, we've made it easier for individuals in crisis to find our services, ensuring immediate support and increased accessibility for those who need it most.

"Meta is proud to partner with Childhelp to support young people and empower them to stay safe online," said Leah Treitman, Safety Policy Manager at Meta. "We're excited for this new curriculum to get into the hands of educators around the country, to help young people feel more confident to spot suspicious behavior online and know where to go for help."

Through these stories, Childhelp reaffirms its mission to bring healing, hope, and unconditional love to children and families in need.

You're Safe Here: Childhelp Advocacy

For children who have experienced the unimaginable, Childhelp Advocacy Centers provide a place of comfort, safety, and healing. These centers offer a child-friendly, trauma-informed environment where young victims of abuse can receive the support they need to begin their recovery.

The centers bring together law enforcement, child protective services, medical professionals, and counselors under one roof, ensuring children do not have to repeat their painful stories. Instead, they share their experiences in a safe and supportive space, helping them start the healing process while justice is pursued.

In addition to reducing retraumatization, the centers provide essential medical evaluations and therapy to address both the emotional and physical scars of abuse. From the moment a child steps through the door, they are met with kindness and care, reinforcing the message that they are safe, believed, and supported. For families, the centers offer resources and guidance to help them navigate the difficult journey of healing.

One powerful example of the centers' impact comes from the story of a 12-year-old girl who disclosed years of sexual abuse by her biological father. When she arrived at the center, she was struggling with deep emotional scars. Suicidal, self-harming, and withdrawn, she wore dark, oversized clothes and hid her face behind her long hair. She had been hospitalized twice for suicidal thoughts.

Over two years of trauma-focused care, her transformation was remarkable. The center's counselors helped her process her abuse, rebuild her sense of safety, and regain her confidence. With the support of Bikers Against Child Abuse (BACA), she even found the courage to face her abuser in court, where he was sentenced to 25 years in prison.

By the end of treatment, she had begun wearing bright clothes, improved her hygiene, and set goals for her future. Her grades improved, reflecting her growing focus and self-confidence. Most importantly, she no longer had thoughts of harming herself and embraced a healthier, more hopeful outlook on life.

On her last day of therapy, her therapist wanted to give her a parting gift to honor her resilience. Unlike many teenagers, she asked for a Barbie Doll. She explained that she used to love playing with Barbies but stopped when the abuse began. For her, the doll was more than a toy–it symbolized the chance to reconnect with the innocence of her childhood, which had been stolen. "I want to remember what it's like to be that girl again," she said.

Childhelp Advocacy Centers offer more than just immediate support—they lay the foundation for lasting healing. Through a combination of compassionate care, expert services, and the unwavering dedication of all involved, these centers help children move from surviving to thriving. Each story of healing is a testament to the hope, love, and strength that Childhelp Advocacy Centers offer to those who need it most.

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You're Not Alone: The Childhelp **National Child** Abuse Hotline

In a world where millions of children suffer in silence, the Childhelp National Child Abuse Hotline stands as a beacon of hope and healing for children, families, and caregivers across the U.S. Since 1982, this critical service has fielded more than 2 million calls, offering comfort and guidance to those in desperate need. Each call represents a moment of courage: a child seeking safety, a parent looking for guidance, or a community member stepping forward to report suspected abuse.

What sets the hotline apart is its trauma-informed, personalized approach. The hotline is staffed 24/7 by professional crisis

counselors and provides confidential support in over 240 languages. Whether through a phone call, text message, or online chat, every voice is heard and every plea is met with compassion. The hotline's reach extends far beyond immediate crisis intervention—it connects callers to a network of resources, including legal support, local child protective services, counseling, and prevention programs. For many, it's the first step in navigating a complex system to find the help they need to rebuild their lives.

Childhelp also recognizes the unique challenges faced by young athletes. To address this, it launched the Childhelp Courage First Athlete Helpline, offering specialized support for athletes dealing

with emotional, physical, or sexual abuse in sports. Together, these two hotlines create a comprehensive safety net for children and

One recent call to the Childhelp National Child Abuse Hotline highlights the transformative impact of these services. A 15-yearold girl from California initially reached out, asking for help for

a friend experiencing neglect and emotional abuse. As the conversation unfolded, she revealed that she was seeking help for herself. She explained that her mother had been struggling since her father's death, spiraling into alcoholism and neglecting her and her siblings. The girl, afraid of being placed in foster care, had hesitated to speak up but found the courage to share her story. The counselor listened with empathy, providing information on

how to access support, including CPS and grief counseling for the family. The girl expressed her gratitude for the help and understanding she received, saying, "Thank you for everything. Really. (Like you) just provide info, but you do change lives. (You) just changed mine."

This story is just one of thousands that highlight the profound difference Childhelp's hotlines make every day. They embody the

organization's mission to provide unconditional love and a safe space for those in crisis. These life-changing services ensure that children, teens, parents, caregivers, and adult survivors of abuse have someone to turn to, day or night, because no one should have to face abuse alone.

Preventing Abuse Through Education: The Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe Program



For millions of children, the sense of safety and care that should define childhood is overshadowed by the threat of abuse. Recognizing the urgent need for prevention, Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe (CH SUBS) is a groundbreaking program that empowers children, families, and communities to prevent and interrupt abuse.

At its core, CH SUBS is more than just a curriculum; it's a movement. Designed for students in grades pre-k-12, the program delivers evidenced-based, age-appropriate lessons to teach children how to recognize unsafe situations, identify safe adults, and speak up assertively when they feel at risk. Engaging activities and open conversations create a foundation of knowledge that builds confidence and resilience in the process.

But the program's true strength lies in its comprehensive approach. It's not just about educating children; it's about empowering entire communities. By providing resources and training for parents, caregivers, educators, and local leaders, CH SUBS builds a network of vigilance and support, ensuring that children have allies at every turn.

This holistic model addresses a wide range of dangers. From physical and emotional abuse to bullying, cyberbullying, and digital safety, CH SUBS equips children with the tools, and resources they need to navigate an ever-evolving world.

The program's impact is felt nationwide, sparking change in classrooms and communities alike. At a recent state boys' wrestling championship, the CH SUBS for Athletes initiative demonstrated its value when a concerned parent approached the program's table. He shared troubling accounts of hazing rituals on his son's team, including instances of sexual harassment in the locker room.

The CH SUBS team listened, educated him on athlete abuse and reporting processes, and provided resources tailored to his concerns. Armed with this information, the parent returned to his community determined to collaborate with school administrators and bring the program to his son's school. His story underscores a key truth: Prevention isn't just about reacting to problems—it's about empowering people to stop them before they occur.

In addition to its national reach, Childhelp has partnered with the U.S. Department of Defense since 2019 to provide CH SUBS on U.S. military bases worldwide, offering vital prevention education and resources to K-5th grade students. In 2025, the partnership is expanding to include grade levels K-12, ensuring even greater support for military families—who often face unique challenges and strengthening the program's mission to safeguard children everywhere.

By addressing abuse prevention openly, CH SUBS is breaking down barriers of stigma and fear. In its wake, it leaves a culture of accountability and support where children feel heard, and

communities unite to protect them.

The message of CH SUBS is simple but profound: every child deserves to grow up without fear, and every adult has a role to play in making that a reality. Through its transformative education and community outreach, CH SUBS is turning this belief into action one child, one family, and one community at a time.

A Brighter Future: Childhelp Foster Care, Relative Care, and Group Homes

Childhelp has been a steadfast advocate for children in need, providing life-changing services that help children and families heal and grow. Through its Childhelp Foster Care, Relative Care, and Group Home programs, Childhelp plays a vital role in supporting children who've experienced trauma, ensuring they receive the love and care they deserve.

Foster Care: A Pathway to Healing

When children are removed from unsafe homes, they face significant emotional, mental, and physical challenges. Childhelp's Foster Care program ensures these children are placed in loving, supportive homes where they can begin their journey of recovery. Across California and Tennessee, 157 children in the Childhelp Foster Care program experienced reunification with their birth families or adoption—an accomplishment that highlights the success of the organization's therapeutic, family-focused approach.

As one foster parent shared, "Because of the expertise of the staff at Childhelp, children are placed in homes where they will receive the utmost care for their physical and emotional needs, and what is best for their family's well-being." Through comprehensive care, children receive therapeutic services at no cost, addressing the deep trauma they have experienced and helping them heal. The Childhelp team works closely with families to provide stability, creating an environment where children can begin to feel safe, loved, and supported once again.

Relative Care: Keeping Families Together

Research shows that children placed with relatives experience fewer behavioral challenges and better emotional outcomes than those placed in non-familial foster care. Childhelp's Relative Care program plays a critical role in maintaining family connections by providing resources and support to relative caregivers. This program helps stabilize families and prevent children from entering

This year, the Childhelp Relative Care program served 222 families and kept 473 children from entering state custody in Tennessee. By offering services like case management, support groups for caregivers, and holiday assistance, the program ensures these families have the resources they need to create safe, loving homes for children. For children who cannot remain with their families due to safety concerns, Childhelp's California Group Homes offer a safe and nurturing environment. These homes provide a trauma-informed space where children can heal, grow, and rebuild their lives. Group home staff is dedicated to creating an atmosphere of stability and consistency, offering children the emotional and therapeutic support they need.

Through these group homes, children have access to case management and therapy to address their unique needs. The goal is not only to provide a temporary safe haven but also to prepare them for a brighter future.

Through these programs, Childhelp is transforming lives and offering hope for a brighter future to children in need. With its

commitment to long-term care, therapy, and family reunification, Childhelp ensures that children in foster and relative care receive the support needed to thrive—not just survive. In a time when the need for child welfare services is growing, Childhelp continues to lead the way in providing a loving, supportive environment for children in crisis.

Nestled on 270 acres in rural Virginia, The Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp serves as a sanctuary for children who have endured abuse, neglect, and behavioral challenges. As a nonprofit psychiatric residential treatment facility, The village offers a serene, nurturing environment where children receive individualized care that addresses their emotional, physical, educational, and spiritual needs. This holistic approach, combined with a variety of therapeutic services, helps children rebuild their lives, empowering them to overcome past trauma and embrace brighter futures.

At the heart of The Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp is a team of compassionate professionals dedicated to the well-being of each child. Children live in age- and gender-appropriate cottages, receiving 24/7 care from a committed staff, including full-time psychiatric support and a dedicated nursing team. Alongside individualized therapy, children engage in recreational and therapeutic activities such as art therapy, sports, and community outings—all designed to promote healing and personal growth.

For many children, like C, the impact of this care is life-changing. At just three years old, C's innocence was shattered by neglect and abuse. After being separated from her mother, she spent years enduring cruelty at the hands of distant relatives. But when C arrived at The Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp, a glimmer of hope emerged. Surrounded by the warmth of compassionate caregivers, C began to rebuild trust and open her heart to healing. One pivotal moment in C's recovery came through horseback riding, an unexpected sanctuary for her troubled spirit. The silent language of the horses and their gentle presence helped her unravel the deep trauma she had carried for so long. With each nudge and soulful gaze, C learned to trust again, finding a sense of peace that had eluded her for years.

The village's holistic approach is evident in the results: 90% of children discharged from the program transition to a lower level of care, demonstrating The village's success in preparing children for life beyond residential care. Academic growth is also a priority, with

children showing significant improvement during their stay. On average, reading skills increase by 1.5 grades, and math skills by 1.2 grades—reflecting the staff's dedication to fostering not only emotional healing but also educational success.

Through therapeutic care, academic support, and life-enriching activities like horseback riding, children at The Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp are given the tools they need to thrive. It is a safe, loving environment where children can rebuild their lives, and its

impact continues to resonate as they reintegrate into homes and communities, prepared for ongoing success.

Through the work of The Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp, the organization remains steadfast in its mission to provide healing and hope to every child who walks through its doors, ensuring they are equipped to live their lives with love, resilience, and the promise of a brighter future.

Financial Stewardship: Ensuring Impact

Thank you for your continued support of Childhelp. We are incredibly grateful for your steadfast commitment to our mission. Your generosity enables us to continue working toward a future where every child can thrive in a world free from abuse and neglect.

I am excited to share Childhelp's financial progress over the past year. Thanks to our action plan, we ended the fiscal year with a surplus of \$27,550,000. While we did face a FY24 operating deficit of \$6,114,000–primarily due to initial operational issues—Childhelp remains debt-free, with \$7,815,000 in cash on hand, \$7,388,000 in accounts receivable, and buildings/land valued at \$17,500,000.

As we enter FY25, despite the operational issues which we addressed over the past year, we still face an operating deficit of \$1,900,000, largely due to the expiration of the two million dollar Childhelp National Child Abuse Hotline Health &

Human Services grant. However, with the continued expansion of our Philanthropy team and increased Marketing efforts, we are actively diversifying revenue sources to strengthen our financial position. I am confident that, with your support, we will continue to grow out of this deficit in the coming years.

The need for Childhelp's services has never been greater, as cases of child abuse and neglect continue to rise nationwide. These challenges only strengthen our resolve to respond with urgency and compassion. With your support, we are investing in long-term solutions that break the cycle of abuse and bring healing to children. Through strong financial stewardship, we remain committed to sustaining this vital work and building a future where every child is safe, supported, and free from harm.

We are confident that, with the ongoing support of our community-donors,



volunteers, board members, and chapter leaders—we will continue to fulfill our promise to the children and families we serve. The seeds of hope we plant today will help build a brighter tomorrow for those who need it most.

Mery Griffin announces donation of Mery Griffin's Wickenburg Inn and Dude Ranch to Childhelp USA. The 192-acre property is located within a 4,700-acre private preserve 70 miles northwest of Phoenix. The facility will be named Childhelp USA Merv Griffin Village of Arizona.

The U.S. House of Representatives passes House Concurrent Resolution 76 with a unanimous vote, supporting the Childhelp USA National Day of Hope. The National Day of Hope is a day reserved for people across the nation to take time to say a prayer and observe a moment of silence in remembrance of the children who die every day from abuse and neglect.

The Goodyear Blimp advertises the Childhelp National Child Abuse Hotline, 1-800-4-A-CHILD, throughout the year.

Grand openings are held for the children's activity centers at the Village of Childhelp West in Beaumont, California, and the Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp East in Lignum, Virginia.

New chapters and auxiliaries are chartered across the United States. These continue to develop and grow to this day.

Childhelp USA celebrates its 40th Anniversary.

A grand opening and dedication of the Childhelp Children's Center of Arizona, an advocacy center for children in Phoenix, Arizona, is held in November.

> A toddler group home opens in Orange County, California.

110-acres of land in the Smoky Mountains becomes home to the foster care program in East Tennessee.

Groundbreaking takes place for the children's activity

center at the Childhelp Village in Beaumont, California. The Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp East in Lignum, Virginia, opens a new school and another cottage that will house 16 more children.

Childhelp celebrates the grand opening and dedication of its new headquarters and relocation of the national child abuse hotline to Scottsdale, Arizona.

> Childhelp participates in the Stand For Children march in Washington, D.C.

Children's Advocacy Center of Manhattan, a project of Childhelp, opens in Manhattan, New York.

A grand opening for the Childhelp Children's Center of Knoxville, Tennessee is held.

The Childhelp Southern Regional Office, located in Knoxville, Tennessee, opens its offices with the goal of breaking ground for a children's advocacy center, a onestop center for interviewing victims of sexual abuse.

The Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp East opens in Lignum, Virginia.

Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the National Caring Award from the National Caring Institute in Washington, D.C. and the Hubert Humphrey Memorial Award from the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C.

The Adult Survivor Program, an on-going therapy and support program for those who have survived abuse, is launched

> Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the Women Who Make a Difference: Women of the Year Award from Family Circle Magazine.

Childhelp USA purchases 270-acres of land in Culpeper, Virginia, which will be the site of the Childhelp east coast village. On October 1, 1991, Childhelp celebrated the groundbreaking of this new residential treatment facility bearing the name of its major benefactor, Alice C. Tyler. This site was dedicated by former First Lady

Barbara Bush.

Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the Kiwanis World Service Medal.

Childhelp expands its specialized foster home program.

The Childhelp National Child Abuse Hotline is expanded, adding a computerized telephone system that is capable of handling up to 5 million calls a year.

A joint research partnership with the University of California, Riverside is established.

Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the National Charity Award from President George H.W. Bush in Washington, D.C.

Childhelp celebrates its 30th Anniversary of providing direct services to children.

> A specialized foster care program to train Childhelp foster parents is established in Southern California.

New chapters are chartered in Arizona, Maryland and Virginia.

> Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the 'Crime Victims Week' Department of Justice Award, presented by President Ronald Reagan.

Childhelp opens two group homes in Orange County, California in conjunction with the Department of Children's Services.

> Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the Excellence for Individual Achievement Award from the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge and are given Citations from Pope John Paul for "recognition of the dedication to the loving care and commitment to protection of abused children in the world."

A village after-care program is designed to serve those children discharged from the village in California, but who still require additional support to complete the healing process.

Childhelp celebrates the opening of its western regional office. It houses the national toll-free hotline and a family evaluation program that provides a complete psycho-social assessment for abused children and their families.

Childhelp produces and airs a national telethon on child abuse, Will We Hear Their Cry?

Children's Village USA name changed to Childhelp USA for national programs and Childhelp International for international activities. Sara O'Meara was the representative from America to the International Union for Child Welfare which enabled the organization to share expertise with child abuse agencies around the world.

Childhelp is instrumental in preparations to establish the International Alliance on Child Abuse and Neglect.

Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Award for leadership in the prevention, treatment and research of child abuse and neglect, nationally and internationally.

Children's Village USA launches its first national campaign for the prevention of child abuse and neglect.

The first national toll-free hotline, 1-800-4-A-CHILD, is implemented by Children's Village USA, operated 24 hours a day, seven days a week staffed exclusively with degreed professional counselors.

Child Abuse and You, a brochure on how to recognize and report child abuse, is published and distributed nationally. Five educational child abuse booklets targeted to teens and pre-teens are also published and circulated to high schools and junior high schools coast-to-coast, including a comic book about child abuse.

Children's Village USA co-sponsors an International Conference on Child Abuse and Neglect with NATO in France.

Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the Mary Ellen Award for Excellence in Child Care by the American

1980 A Time for Love, Children's Village USA's first television special on child abuse and neglect, is aired and syndicated coast-to-coast.

Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the Dame Cross of Merit of the Order of St. John of Denmark for outstanding humanitarian work.

1979 Through the encouragement of Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson, President Jimmy Carter designates the first National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Children's Village USA celebrates its 20th Anniversary.

1978 Children's Village USA opens a residential treatment center in Beaumont, California. This village treats severely-abused children ages 2-12 placed from California counties.

1976 International Orphans Incorporated changes its name to Children's Village USA.

1975 Nancy and Ronald Reagan ask Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson for International Orphans Incorporated to address the problem of child abuse and neglect in the United States. Planning begins for a residential treatment center for abused children and their families.

International Orphans Incorporated helped organize Operation Baby Lift where thousands of orphans were rescued from Vietnam and brought to the United States for adoption.

1973-'74 IOI built and maintained a hospital, school and 5 orphanages in Vietnam.

1972 Congress asked Sara and Yvonne to go into Vietnam to replicate their successes for children in Tokyo.

1970-'71 IOI instituted a Special Friends project to connect helping hearts with Childhelp orphans. A version of this type of program exists to this day.

1969 International Orphans Incorporated celebrates its10th Anniversary.

101 builds 3 more orphanages in Japan.

967 Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson receive the Cross of Merit from the Knightly Order of St. Brigitte for humanitarian work as co-founders of International Orphans Incorporated.

1966 Chiyoko, the first Japanese-American orphan brought to the United States by International Orphans Incorporated is adopted.

1961-'65 IOI begins building two large orphanages in the Tokyo area for Amerasian children.

1960 International Orphans is incorporated (IOI)

International Orphans is founded by Sara Buckner (O'Meara) and Yvonne Lime (Fedderson) in Tokyo, Japan to care for Japanese-American children who were considered "throw away" children because of their mixed heritage.

Two young Hollywood actresses, Sara (Buckner) O'Meara and Yvonne (Lime) Fedderson, met playing the bubbly girlfriends of Ricky and David Nelson on The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet. Little did they know at the time, it was a friendship that would last a lifetime.
